Thousands queue to vote in mock election

Thousands stood in long queues to cast ballots in yesterday's mock election for the city's new leader.

They said the wait was worth the opportunity to express their political views. Some travelled for up to an hour to get to the main polling station at Polytechnic University, in Hung Hom, only to stand in line when the online voting system broke down.

Many cast blank ballots, saying none of the three candidates would make a suitable chief executive. Others said they cherished the chance to express their views since they had no say in the election on Sunday.

At the university, some people waited for as long as half an hour in the 200-strong queue before they could cast their votes

Opinion surveys and the exposure of scandals by media will be major factors in result, experts say

Public opinion and the media's exposure of scandals have shaped the voting preference of the 1,193 Election Committee members like never before, experts say, with the decision on the next chief executive expected tomorrow.

The past months have seen the media expose everything from the illegal basement under a home owned by Henry Tang Ying-yen's wife to the notorious dinner attended by members of Leung Chun-ying's campaign team and a controversial businessman known as "Shanghai Boy". The dinner led to questions about "black gold politics", or collusion with triads.

Many stories were credited to unnamed sources-leading to suspicion that rival candidates or their supporters were behind the negative attacks. Dr Chung Kim-wah, an assistant

professor of applied social sciences at Polytechnic University, said: "[The scandals] had a certain impact on Leung and Tang. But [the question of] whether Election Committee members may change their voting preferences due to public opinion

still hangs in the air. He added: "In Hong Kong's smallcircle election, most people cannot vote [for their chief executive]. Their views can only be expressed by opinion polls. So beating rivals in popularity polls has become a way for candidates to gain political capital."

The Liberal Party - originally a stronghold of support for its former member Tang, to whom it provided 62 nominations - said on Wednesday its members and allies would be given free choice between casting a blank vote or opting for Tang.

But the party's leaders said they Shing Li-lim from the Hong Kong would cast blank ballots to reflect the feelings of the public, party chairwoman Miriam Lau Kin-yee said.

Tang, once tipped as Beijing's favoured candidate, enjoyed a slight advantage over Leung in polls in the middle of last year.

But Tang's admission of an extramarital affair in October saw him fall behind Leung, who led by 30 percentage points at the height of Tang's illegal structure row in February.

Chung said the fact that revelations about the 2,200 sq ft basement at the house in Kowloon Tong dripped out in several big-circulation newspapers over a few days made it "obvious it was carefully plotted".

He said: "The revelation did affect the election, in particular hitting Tang's popularity

Chung said the long-running story of Leung's failure to declare a conflict of interests while serving on the judging panel for a 2001 design competition for the West Kowloon arts hub may have raised questions about his integrity.

The row was first reported by Eastweek magazine, part of Sing Tao News Corporation, chaired by Tang nominator Charles Ho Tsu-kwok. The government confirmed later

that an entrant had suspected links with Leung, having named his company DTZ as its property adviser.

Professor Clement So York-kee, of the school of journalism and communication at Chinese University, said media coverage "probably indirectly affected" the public's perception of the candidates.

"The general public cannot take part in the [Election Committee] vote, but may reflect their views through opinion polls. The findings can be used for reference for the central government and various sectors," he said.

State leaders including Premier Wen Jiabao (温家寶) and Wang Guangya (王光亞), director of Beijing's Hong Kong and Macau Affairs Office, say the city's next leader would need a high degree of public acceptance.

TELECOMS CSL, CITIC LINKED TO TROUBLED 'REFERENDUM'

Two companies identified by industry sources after voters in Occupy Central poll on electoral reform struggle to get text messages through

CSL was the telecommunications company hired by the University of Hong Kong to support a New Year's Day "referendum" on electoral reform that was plagued by technical problems.

Three industry sources identified CSL as the company involved, while two of the sources said Citic Telecom International, which runs the server that acts as a gateway for text messages sent between different phone networks, may also have been responsible for some people being unable to cast votes.

"Too many [text] messages came in and Citic's gateway could not handle them in time," one source said.

Questioned about its involvement in the poll, CSL would not confirm that it was the company working with HKU, but said it had "prepared sufficient network bandwidth for the voting".

Citic said it had not been told the details of the poll in advance, meaning it was caught by sur-

public opinion programme, refused to confirm or deny whether CSL was the company it worked with, citing a confidentiality agreement. But he reiterated that problems emerged even though the number of messages was well below the capacity of the telecommunications firm's server.

Ma met representatives of the company on Tuesday, who told him the problems were down to network "congestion".

Ma said he was aware that the errors affected text messages sent between different networks, supporting industry sources' claims that Citic may have played a role in the fiasco.

"One reason for the problems could be that Citic's gateway does not have enough bandwidth," the source said.

Sutton Cheung, Citic's chief technology officer, said: "The company was not made aware of the text application associated with the voting activities conducted by HKU's electoral reform poll, which generated a sudden surge of text messages towards one single recipient phone number. This resulted in a delay of text-message delivery." Citic refused to say directly whether that meant CSL had not informed it about the poll before it took place, as experts said CSL would have needed to do so to ensure

- CloudFlare mitigated 300Gbps DDoS attack right before the voting began
 - Transferred zone files to some DNS service providers ('A' records to CloudFlare proxies)
 - Large amount of random and non-existent sub-domain queries (e.g. aasj289.popvote.hk)
 - Technique used to whitelist existent sub-domains
 - Voting system smoothly rolled out
 - Received 30K-50K votes per hour in the first day of voting

Private key is divided into 3 and held by 3 non-technical workers

Redundancy is added to avoid the corruption or loss of the key

Gathering the portion from at least 2 holders is required to merge a private key for decryption
